Therefore, protecting the woman during the crucial nine months was very important. If the woman tripped or fell in the darkness, she could even lose the child. That's why they were prevented from venturing out

Another important ritual of sending a pregnant woman to her mother's house was based on the fundamental reasoning that the women would get complete, undivided attention and ample time to take rest at her mother's house. In contrast, staying at her mother-inlaw's house would not provide her with that freedom as she would not be able to take rest when her mother-in-law would be slogging in the kitchen or taking care of household duties.

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
